Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions:

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:-
 - a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or when the designated supervisor has a licence suspended
2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence (see section 19 Licensing Act 2003)
3. Where a condition applies requiring a person to carry out a security activity at the premises those individuals must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority (see section 21 Licensing Act 2003)
4. Where a premises licence authorises the exhibition of films, the admission of children to the exhibition of any film is to be restricted in accordance with section 20 Licensing Act 2003.

Conditions 5,6, 7 and 9 do not apply to premises licences where it authorises only the sale by retail off the premises.

5.—(1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children—

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—

- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;

(d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on—

- (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or

(ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
(e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.

6. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

7. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

8.—(1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

9. The responsible person shall ensure that—

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—

- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and

(b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

For the purposes of these conditions a responsible person is

- the holder of a premises licence in respect of the premises,
- the designated premises supervisor (if any) under such a licence, or
- (any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised for the purposes of this section by such a holder or supervisor,

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule:

1. Intoxicating liquor shall not be sold on the premises otherwise than to persons taking table meals there and for consumption by such persons as an ancillary to his meal.

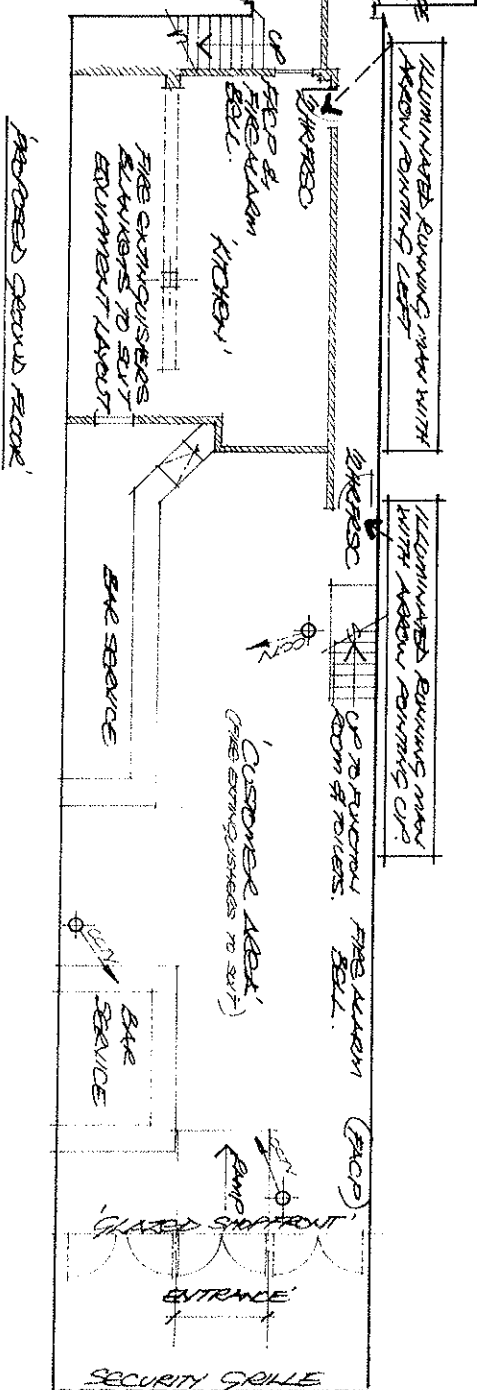
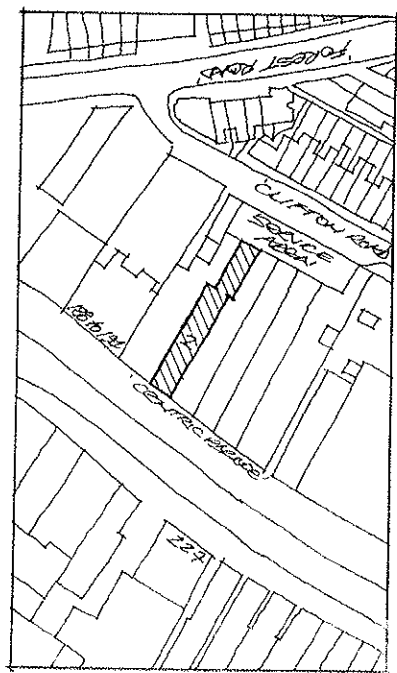
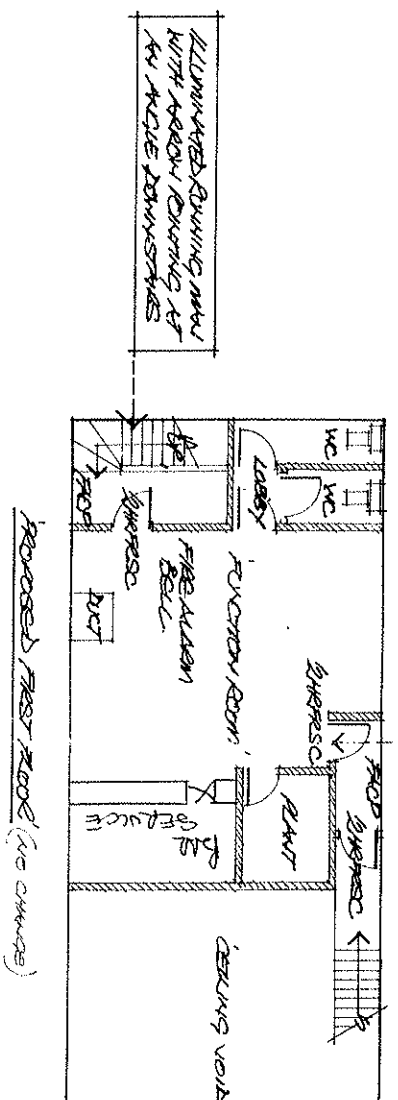
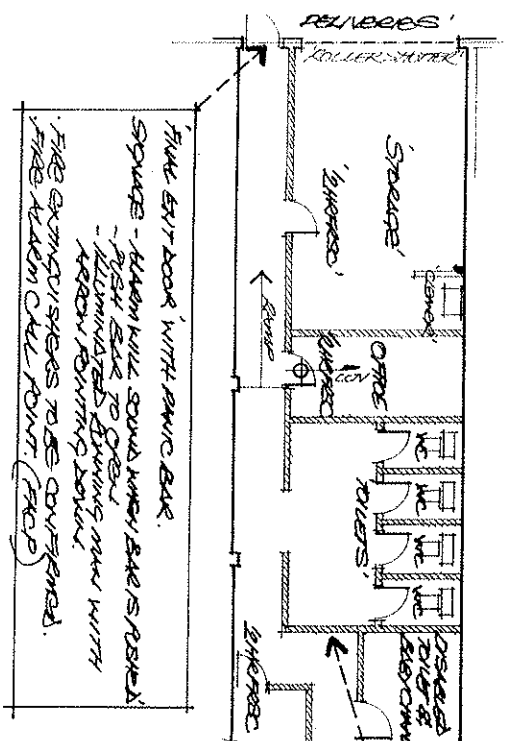

On behalf of the Council's Environment & Street Scene Directorate, I confirm receipt of a copy of your application dated **25 July 2012** that I received on 26th July 2012 regarding the above mentioned property, in relation to the Licensing objective the Prevention of Public nuisance.

I have made a representation to the Council's Licensing Section with regard to the Licensing objective – Prevention of Public nuisance, due to concerns about the following:

1. Noise from Customers smoking and drinking outside the front and rear of the licensed premises.
2. Loud music escaping from the front and rear of the licensed premises.
3. Noise from the emptying of bottles.
4. Increase of litter/noise from patrons smoking and the lack of any smoking areas.

However, I believe that all of these issues could be controlled and if suitable conditions are imposed I would be happy to withdraw the representation(s) if the operating schedule is amended accordingly or if you agree to a suitable condition(s) being imposed as part of the licence, or if you provide sufficient evidence to confirm that the representation can be withdrawn.

The conditions I propose are :

1. No patrons are to be allowed rear access to the outside through the licensed premises apart from in the case of an emergency.

Reason: To ensure that any noise from patrons does not cause a public nuisance.

2. Clear and prominent notices shall be displayed by entrances/exits requesting customers respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and area quietly.

Reason: To control the level of disturbance from patrons entering/leaving the licence premise to prevent a public nuisance.

3. Cigarette bins are to be made available to patrons out the front of the premises whilst it is open for business.

Reason: To reduce the amount of litter deposited by patrons on to the street

4. Bottles shall be placed into the outside bins no later than 21.00 hours.

Reason: To protect noise sensitive properties from a public nuisance.

5. The Premise Supervisor (or representative) shall monitor the volume of music emanating from the premises and adjust the volume to ensure that any amplified sound or other music from the licensed premises does not cause a public nuisance.


Reason: To ensure that any music and amplified sound from the licensed premises does not cause a public nuisance.

6. I have noticed that there are no provision made from smokers on the plans attached to the licence application, so I can only conclude that they would be invited outside the front of the licensed premise to smoke. I have grave concerns regarding the noise that patrons could make outside the front of the property especially if a large number of patrons decide to smoke at the same time late at night. I would welcome you to put forward a condition that would allow me to remove my representation on this point.

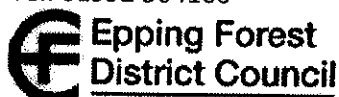

The LRA Plans Group believes that late-evening alcohol licences are not appropriate in residential areas. We are aware that residents in the High Road and surrounding roads already suffer disturbance and thoughtless parking from late night drinking venues. We believe that given the cumulative effect of this application on top of existing late night licences, there should be no further opening after 11pm

On behalf of local residents (listed below on page 3) all of whom live near to the premises, and on our own behalf, we object to this application. We consider that these residents have supplied the Council with more than enough first-hand evidence on the current impact of these premises for this application to be refused.

The LRA Plans Group looks at all planning & licensing applications in Loughton; it operates completely separately from those LRA Councillors who are, or might be, involved as Councillors in Town or District Council planning or licensing meetings, under a Protocol agreed with the District Council in respect of planning matters (and which we apply equally to licensing cases, on a voluntary basis).

General summary

The LRA Plans Group believes that any further early-morning opening, with an alcohol licence, is not appropriate for the High Road. All the roads to and from the premises, including the High Road itself, are residential (there are flats over the High Road shops) and the cumulative effect of further noise from these premises, and from customers entering and leaving the premises after midnight, is unacceptable (even if customers using the premises are well-behaved (not always the case) there is inevitably noise when they leave, which is far more noticeable and disturbing for residents after mid-night when other things are much quieter. Residents should be allowed the peaceful enjoyment of their properties at night.)

Objections related to the Licensing Objectives

The grounds for the objection are that it would:

- i) Increase **crime and disorder** in the immediate vicinity, and along the roads leading to/from the premises, due to the nature / hours of operation of the business, and the possibility of customers consuming excess alcohol in public and the effects thereof.

ii) create a **public nuisance**, in the form of

- noise from music in the premises, particularly when windows and doors are left open. We have had complaints of loud noise at unacceptable times, when special events have been held here into the early hours of the morning. The effect would obviously be heightened if any form of music licence is granted.
- noise from customers leaving the building (residential properties are located all around the property)

iii) **Protection of children** from harm – noise after 11pm will increase the risk of disturbed nights for children living nearby, with consequent effects on their schooling; at times when other noises have reduced and such disturbances can be heard over a wider area

If the Council is minded to grant part or all of the application.

As we state above, we do not consider that these premises should be granted a licence beyond 11pm, or any form of music licence. However, if the Council is minded

- to grant the application for any form of music and/or
- to allow opening after 11pm

then we ask that (irrespective of whether the applications relating to music are approved) strong conditions be attached to the licence to prevent noise disturbance to nearby residents, as covered in the advice on Public Nuisance (sections 2.33 to 2.37) in the Amended Home Office Guidance Issued Under Section 182 Of The Licensing Act 2003, April 2012

Appendix 2: AMENDED HOME OFFICE GUIDANCE ISSUED UNDER SECTION 182 OF THE LICENSING ACT 2003, April 2012

PUBLIC NUISANCE

- 2.33 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.
- 2.34 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It is important to remember that the prevention of public nuisance could therefore include low level nuisance, perhaps affecting a few people living locally, as well as major disturbance affecting the whole community. It may also include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises.
- 2.35 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will normally concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or more sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts. Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises. Licensing authorities should be aware of the need to avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are very expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.
- 2.36 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where the provisions of the Environmental Protection Act 1990, the Noise Act 1996, or the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.
- 2.37 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, music noise from premises usually occurs from mid-evening until either late-evening or early-morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise immediately surrounding the premises may also prove appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.

I have been advised that an application is to be made to vary the licence (Late night supply of alcohol, music and dancing) for the White Bull Brasserie, soon to be renamed Whites.

I object.

Do we not have enough problems in Loughton without promoting further potential disturbances? The Police, who are spoken of but rarely sighted, appear unable to control the drunken yobs who, on leaving local venues in the early hours of the morning stagger up and down the local streets. Particularly on Fridays and Saturdays nights/mornings, shouting and screaming at each other and generally causing fear to the local residents, before getting into their cars and driving off. I write in this instance of the many elderly residents of Forest Road (IG10) Then there is the damage to cars and other property that is regularly to be seen in the morning as well as glasses and bottles left lying in the street and front gardens together with trails and pools of vomit.

Is it worth reporting any damage to the police? An example I have of police investigation is of some months ago being called upon at my home address by two PCSO's, who were making house to house enquires in connection with a burglary that had taken place in Forest Road some 24 days previously. No exaggeration, 24 days! I asked the female PCSO who appeared to be leading the activity some questions about the method of entry employed, to which she had no knowledge. Very encouraging. I understand that the above business intends to apply to extend its late evening alcohol licence. I strongly object to this course being taken. I am a local resident living at [redacted] High Road, Loughton, [redacted] which is almost directly opposite the venue.

At present I am disturbed by their customers coming out of there drunk and noisily on a regular basis. For example one evening they had a party that went on until about 1am the weather was terrible yet the door to the restaurant was open to allow smokers to come in and out, meaning the already extortionate noise level was even worse. To give you some idea as to noise level it sounded like I had a DJ in my lounge. Smokers outside where the music inside the venue was so loud and they were probably intoxicated were shouting to each other in order to be heard and laughing loudly. It was like a competition to be heard above the noise.

On leaving the venue people were seen staggering all over the show, chatting and shouting out to one another across the street or down the road from each other. There was absolutely no consideration for residents. Cars were revving loudly on leaving the venue. Parking was diabolical as it is limited in the High Road which meant when people were going back to their cars they were having conversations loudly and you could hear music playing from the cars. As people were driving away they were tooting their car horns and speeding off.

White Bull Brasseire had absolutely no control over their patrons nor did they seem to care about all this noise and disturbance this caused to local residents.

On a separate occasion I heard a lot of commotion coming from the street when I looked out of my window I saw a drunken woman come out of the White Bull and go and lie down near the kerb but in the road. Her friends were laughing and screaming at her until eventually a man came and scooped her up. It was about 11pm.

On another occasion a group left the White Bull it was just after 11.30pm and were singing loudly up the street.

The High Road might be perceived as a lively town centre and this should be expected but Loughton is actually unique as it is highly residential. There are flats above most of the shops all along the High Road. All the side streets must also be affected they too are residential and must suffer people parking down there and behaving in the same manner.

To even consider a late licence virtually every evening is absurd. People have to get to work the following days and to have disturbed sleep as a result of late licensing is unfair and inconsiderate. I do not see why they need such a late licence. Clearly the application is money orientated.

Surely the purpose of a brassiere is to serve food as its main business not alcohol. We have one too many public houses for that. Also I would like to point out that allowing live and recorded music means disturbance as it is always played above a reasonable level. If you complain to the noise officers they offer to write a letter to the venue which is completely ineffective as the venue carry on.

I would urge you to consider how you would feel if this was on your doorstep, would you grant it or be happy with this sort of regular, unsocial behaviour and noise pollution? I think not.

I complain on the basis of prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance.

I Wish the LRA to make representations strongly on my behalf.

My name is Rachael Evelyn, I live at ___ Loughton Highroad () opposite Whites (previously known as The White Bull). I am here at work exhausted as I was kept up until 00:50 this morning 21st August, due to the ridiculous level of noise from Whites customers last night. I couldn't even read to take my mind off the noise let alone sleep, I am 24 years old and I know it's nice to let off steam but not in such a residential area on a MONDAY NIGHT/TUESDAY MORNING! I am up at 7 AM. This is not fair, it is stressful, and if this is a sign of what's to come with this late alcohol license I am going to find this incredibly upsetting as I need my sleep.

Since Thursday I have noticed the level of noise increase dramatically, the later longer hour with the music blasting out and customers shouting to be heard, but it wasn't until last night that it really took the piss. Drunken customers shouting down an empty street with no consideration for anybody else.

The White Bull has already caused problems in past in our house hold, blasting music out past 1 AM, resulting in my male housemate going down and telling them to turn it down, which lasts around 30 minutes and then back up. This has happened on two occasions.

I have already witnessed 2 gangs/groups of people have a massive dispute in the White Bull, which escalated out into the street where bottles were being smashed, a chair was picked up and thrown at the Bull's window of restaurant and waiters had to pull women underneath the shutters as they closed to protect them while the gang ran and the police came AND this was only 10:30 at night. I wanted to move my car out of the way of bottles being thrown but I was too frightened to go down. I don't want this, I don't want this level of violence. I find along with my household and neighbours Whites already hard to live with, and with a late alcohol license, these incidents are only going to increase because it's the clientele this place attracts and after more alcohol more hours, the rude inconsiderate customers, the drunken behaviour, gang disagreements, shouting, violence is going to make me feel intimidated in my own flat.

We already have Nu Bar and Lunx, which are perfect examples of young people drinking to the early hours. The fights, the mess... Do we really need another late night bar in Loughton, in the centre of the Highroad as well. Keep Loughton a lovely place and say no to encouraged late night binge drinking... It attracts the wrong people, it attracts violence. It's intimidating and embarrassing.

The Last Post has never been a problem because it closes at 11PM, which is a reasonable time not unsocial hours. I hope you take my comments into consideration as the approval or dismissal of this application is really going to effect me and my house mates.

Dear Licensing at EFDC,

I live at number 2 Clifton Rd, Loughton with my Wife and Newborn Baby.

I am writing to object to a recent application by 'The White Bull Brasserie' (to be renamed 'Whites') of 2 Centric Parade, High Rd Loughton to vary their license.

I would like to object to the following that they have applied for:

- *License to serve alcohol until Midnight on Sunday - Thursdays and until 1.30am on Friday and Saturdays.
- *License to play recorded music
- *License for live music
- *Late night refreshments
- *Provision for facilities for dancing
- * Supply of alcohol

I object to this application on the grounds of 'the protection of children from harm' and 'the prevention of public nuisance'.

The protection of children from harm

The front of our house is approximately 12 metres from the back entrance of 2 Centric Parade, where staff enter and exit. I have a newborn baby who's bedroom is at the front of the house. If this license is granted I believe the health of our baby will be affected due to noise coming from the establishment. I fear our baby will sleep less efficiently leading to development problems. Noise such as bottle emptying, staff taking breaks, DJ's and Band's packing up after the night and cars being started in the early hours when leaving the premises are the kind of noise we would hear if this license were granted.

Staff smoking during their breaks at the back door currently takes place. I fear a later license would mean more people smoking out the back, which can be smelt in our baby's room if the window is open. Smoking is of course detrimental to the health of children and adults alike.

The noise from 2 Centric Parade can already be heard in our baby's bedroom, even with the window shut. It is unreasonable to expect the residents of Clifton road to keep their windows shut in the summer months or any other month of the year.

On the weekend of 11th August 2012, 2 Centric Parade played loud music from 1am until 4am. We could hear this from our bedroom which is at the front of the house. This kept us awake most of the night and I fear this would be a common occurrence if this licence were to be granted,

I believe a license of this kind is completely unsuitable for a highly residential area of this kind.

The prevention of public nuisance

The high street is already full of late night establishments that have late alcohol licenses. These establishments regularly have incidents where their customers end up brawling outside in the early hours of the morning, with the police being called. The litter created by customers of these premises is also a problem as anyone who walks along the High Rd the next morning can see. If 2 Centric Parade are allowed a change to their license, I fear they will have the same problems, therefore adding to the trouble already experienced on the high street on Friday and Saturday night. This sort of thing is a nuisance to residents in the local area and visitors to the high street in general.

Please inform me when the meeting to discuss this application is, as we would like to attend.
