Policing Structure

- Two Community Policing Teams (CPT) based at Loughton Police Station comprising of 2 Sergeants, 9 Constables, and 7
 PCSOs.
- Town Centre Team comprising of 1 Sergeant, 8 constables.
- Epping Forest District Council fund the Community Safety Team (CST) comprising of 1 Sergeant and 2 Police Constables.
- There is a dedicated rural officer who is shared between Epping Forest and Brentwood.
- Two Children and Young Persons Officers (CYP)
- Community Safety Engagement Officer (CSEO)
- Criminal Investigation Department (CID)
- Local Policing Team (LPT) is based at Loughton Police Station. 24/7 cover comprising of 5 Inspectors, 5 Sergeants, 55
 Police Constables. 1 Uplift Sergeant for Casework and allocations.

Ongar ASB: issues, actions taken and outcome

How was it identified:

Complaints were made by residents and Councillors regarding Antisocial behavior in Ongar

Action taken:

- Targeted patrols from CPT and CST.
- Dog walkers, carpark users and parents taking children to the playground have been engaged with.
- CYP Officers used Body Worn Footage, taking it into schools for teachers to identify children responsible for ASB. From this, 17 youths were identified. PC Shepherd worked with EFDC and letters were drawn up and hand delivered to eight of the youths responsible for the ASB.
- The school is sanctioning some of those students.

Success:

- Significant reduction in issues in the area.
- The library staff have noticed a difference in the area with little to no issues reported lately.
- Regular patrols of the area has been posted on social media, coupled with advice on how to report ASB if seen.
- Positive outcomes.
